The 'Mystery' Tree

There was huge amount of interest in this very unusual tree, exhibited by Takuo Nakamura. He knows it by it's common name "Madagascar Tree".

After some searching online we've found the latin name of the tree for those searching for one to buy. It's a mouthful, **Operculicarya** decaryi.

It has other common names including Jabily and elephant tree. Per Wikipedia, It's a thick stemmed succulent plant species found in Madagascar and also grown as a bonsai tree. Tak says it grows fast.

Once you have the latin name you'll find the plant is available from many sources including San Marcos Growers. You can order from them through major retail nurseries like Armstrongs. Other sources are also available. Good luck!



Mystery Accent

This little plant also caused a lot of conversation. It was shown by Harley Newman and was part of his late wife's collection of rare succulents. I've determined that it's in the genus Albuca but there are over a hundred species in that genus and i've not found this exact one.
