Bonsai Containers; Powerpoint lecture and Bring-A-Pot Appraisal

Michael Ryan Bell, often referred to simply as MRB online, began doing Bonsai seriously in 2008 and purchased his first quality bonsai container in 2010. After a few months trying to find information on that container and others he realized that there was truly a lack of information available in English on Bonsai containers. He set out to rectify that situation by creating a Chop and Signature database and a website with container artists profiles and

biographies.

At present, there are more bonsai specific pottery artists marks on his site, than in any single publication, in any language and it's still growing.

It is his stated mission to raise the standards of appreciation, awareness and selection of quality bonsai containers in the community. Since he began teaching about bonsai pottery, Ryan has lectured at the National Bonsai Exhibitions in America and the UK, the GSBF convention as a coheadliner and at nearly 100 clubs and organizations and. Also serves on the board for the American Bonsai Society.

February's PowerPoint presentation will contain an even mix of beginner, intermediate and advanced information on those topics to appeal to bonsai enthusiasts of all levels and there will be a Q and A session and an appraisal hour to follow.

In Loving Memory of Harley Newman



Harley Newman, born in April 1933 to Charles and Opal Newman in Rock Rapids, Iowa, peacefully passed away on Monday, 20 November 2023 at the age of 90. His life was a testament to resilience, love, and dedication to family.

In the late 1930s, the Newman family relocated to Sioux Falls, South Dakota, where Harley forged lifelong friendships and, fatefully, met the love of his life, Floy. Their connection blossomed over the years, leading to a beautiful marriage that endured until Floy's passing in 2015.

Harley's journey took a turn in 1953 when he answered the call to duty and was drafted into the US Army. In the heart of their journey together, Harley and Floy were blessed with three children -- David, Doni, and Daniel. As a father, Harley was

a pillar of strength, wisdom, and unwavering support. The family thrived under his guidance in the welcoming community of Costa Mesa, California, where lasting memories were created and cherished.

Harley's two years spent in Japan instilled him with deep interest and passion for Bonsai and Suiseki, a passion which he renewed with vigor upon his retirement from his career in aerospace. The friendships he forged in the California Bonsai and Suiseki communities brought him great joy and buoyed him through the remainder of his life. His surviving family recognize and value these friendships Harley forged.

Harley Newman will be remembered not only for his professional achievements but also for his warmth, generosity, and love for family and friends. His legacy lives on in the lives he touched and the values he instilled in those around him.
